The holidays are typically a time for celebration, though for many it can be filled with expectations, pressure and stress. Whether you are someone who is returning home for the first time after leaving for college, a single parent who has been struggling to manage finances while studying, come from a dysfunctional family or a family that struggles to understand you, unable to return home for Christmas due to other responsibilities, lost a loved one who you are missing terribly or concerned about managing your T3 studies with events you want to attend. Here are some tips to manage during this somewhat chaotic time:

- Evaluate your values and goals does the goal of having the perfect Christmas outweigh the value of spending time with your loved ones? What is more important, presents or your presence?
- Plan a meal or event that is realistically achievable and manageable for you remember what the meal is actually about.
- Find ways to meaningfully connect with your loved ones you may engage in activities like puzzles, board games or swimming somewhere local or video call if you can't be there.
- Keep to your routine as much as practical try to maintain good <u>sleep hygiene</u> habits and go to bed closer to your normal time.
- Minimise overindulgence of alcohol and food you typically wouldn't eat.
- Make time to rest and take a break over these holidays schedule your study around these days, sometimes not being productive is productive!
- Engage in relaxation strategies like short walks in nature, breathing exercises and take breaks away when you need it.
- Mindfulness is all about remaining present, try these <u>mindfulness techniques</u> to keep you and your children from stressing about what is to come and what has been.
- Reflect on the positive memories of your lost loved ones.
