Recent research has revealed that successful online global collaboration starts with something more fundamental: mindset.







- Advocacy for global learning





- Mindset shifts required








2. Open Sharing

- Digital network utilization








3. Open Contributing

- Universal engagement opportunities





- What are my assumptions about control?


Current Practices:




